Twelve months after David Hiniker and Marty Maehr were steamrolled in the open championships of the Ann Arbor Doubles Tennis Tournament by Steve Jacobson and Andy Vance, the duo evened the score.

lost, so they expected a tougher outing in this year's championship than last year's. Hiniker vastly improved in the past year after playing for Harvard University as a freshman.

"Midway through the first set, we said 'We've already taken as many games as we did last year, so everything from here on out is bonus," Hiniker said. "We took the underdog approach." Hiniker and Maehr, the No. 2

two opposing serves in the first set while holding all six of their own. In the second, they broke another serve to take a 5-4 lead.

"I was a lot more confident in my serves and my volleys this year," Hiniker said. "Those weren't shots I had last year.'

In the women's 9.0 field, Barbara Burke and Darlee Towler eased past Joanne Meagher and Carol Miller in a 6-0, 6-1 win.

"They were a little off today," Towler said. "They're generally

more consistent than they were today.

Meagher and Miller agreed. "We tried the whole time, but we didn't always come up with our shots and they did," Meagher said. "They stayed mentally tough the whole time.'

In a result as pleasing to the crowd as to the players, Jim Hamilton and Chris Nelson beat Mike Psarouthakis and Alan Radke, 7-6, 7-6, for the men's 9.0 division title. The two-set match lasted more than three hours.

"If it went a third set, they would've been stronger than us, Hamilton said.

Nelson and Hamilton also used two tiebreakers to beat Noe Erasga and Michael Stenman in Saturday's semifinals.

In the men's 8.0 finals, topseeded Jeff Alson and David Smith beat No. 2-seeded Michael Kelly-Sell and Greg Lambert for championship.
